THE FUTURE OF FACDIS

Since the grant which has funded the activities of FACDIS ends June 30th, the question of whether and how to continue FACDIS has been a top priority for us all. The answer to the question of whether to continue FACDIS has been a resounding "Yes." Questionnaires were sent out November 4, 1982 to all FACDIS faculty, and were returned by 81% of our 125 participating faculty. This expression of widespread support for the continuation of FACDIS was reaffirmed at the March 18th plenary session at the Third Annual Workshops in International Studies where the future of FACDIS was discussed. Thirty-six faculty from 13 institutions attended this session and all agreed that FACDIS should continue.

The next question was the nature of the future FACDIS. Two plans were adopted at the plenary session. The preferred plan called "The Ambitious Plan" provides for a FACDIS headquarters with a Secretariat to be located at West Virginia University consisting of a Director and an Administrative Assistant. Approximately \$30,000 would be necessary to cover the released time for the Director and for the Administrative Assistant. These funds would be sought from the West Virginia Board of Regents and from West Virginia University. A major responsibility of the Director would be to secure additional external grants to carry out FACDIS activities and projects.

In the event that it proved impossible to implement the Ambitious Plan, a fall-back position called "The Modest Proposal" would be implemented. This would consist of continuing the two FACDIS projects which faculty gave the highest priority to — the annual workshops and the FACDIS Newsletter. The support for the annual workshops (to cover honoraria and travel expenses for consultants and a speaker) would be provided by an annual contribution of \$150 from each of our 16 institutions. The costs for the FACDIS Newsletter (xerox and postage) would be covered by \$5.00 annual dues from each faculty member.

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THE FUTURE OF FACDIS (cont.)

The month of April is being devoted to securing the institutional support necessary to prove institutional commitment to FACDIS. All faculty members were asked to provide their Institutional Representatives with letters addressed to their chief administrators affirming contributions of FACDIS and urging institutional support. Institutional Representatives will meet with their chief administrators during April to secure a letter of support which states (1) commitment to make an institutional contribution of \$150 to FACDIS; and (2) support for the goals of FACDIS.

Thus far we have already received letters of institutional commitment and support from three chief administrators. We are most grateful to Dr. H. Dean Peters, Vice President for Academic Affairs (Fairmont State College), Dr. Jeanne Kammer Neff, Academic Vice President (Wheeling College), and to Dr. Carolyn J. Zinn, Academic Dean (Shepherd College) for their prompt response to the request for their support. The deadline for securing institutional support is April 30th and we are hopeful that by the end of the month we will have received letters from all the institutions. We thank all of you for your help and support.

It is obvious to all FACDIS faculty that each and every one of us has a role to play in the continuation of FACDIS. This is as it should be since no institution should feel an obligation to FACDIS if their faculty have not communicated their judgement about its value.

THE THIRD ANNUAL WORKSHOPS IN INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

Ninety-three West Virginia faculty, consultants and speakers gathered for the Third Annual Workshops in International Studies March 17-19th at the Lakeview Resort and Conference Center in Morgantown. During the first workshop on THE COMPARATIVE APPROACH APPLIED: WOMEN AROUND THE WORLD, three sessions were led by Dr. Janice Monk (Department of Geography and the Southwest Institute for Research on Women, University of Arizona) on the topic "Women and Development"; and three were led by Dr. Joyce Nielsen (Department of Sociology and Women's Studies Program, University of Colorado) on the topic "Public and Private Lives." One of the most innovative of the workshops organized thus far by FACDIS, these sessions were well attended and provided many new ideas and materials for course development and revision.

Demonstration of a course on Women in International Development at West Virginia University by Edward Pytlik (Technology Education) and Judith Stitzel (Women's Studies) provided insight into new teaching methods and materials in a field which is attracting increasing attention in government and academia.

Of the 62 FACDIS faculty members who attended this Workshop, 76% completed and returned our evaluation questionnaire, the large majority (93%) giving the Workshop an overall evaluation of "very positive" (57%) and "positive" (36%). Eighty-five percent said the Workshop was "outstanding" or "very good" in terms of providing up-to-date information on important ideas and trends in the field. Other questions on the quality of the Workshop received similar high marks.

During the second Workshop on THE COMPARATIVE APPROACH AND THE SOCIAL SCIENCES, three sessions were conducted on four topics:

 Comparative Perspectives on Trade, Debt, and Development in Selected Third World Countries (Consultant: Cheryl Payer, Author, The Debt Trap)
 Comparative Social Welfare Policy, Comparative Social Research, and the Comparative Approach in Sociology (Consultant: Richard Tomasson; Department of Sociology, University of New Mexico)

Course demonstrations provided the opportunity for FACDIS faculty members to demonstrate innovations in many courses including two FACDIS-sponsored projects: "Area Studies Through Film" and "Comparative Sociology."

Of the 72 FACDIS faculty members who attended this Workshop, 74% completed and returned our evaluation questionnaire judging the Workshop overall as "very positive" (45%) and "positive" (47%). Again, 85% of the faculty said the Workshop was "outstanding" or "very good" in terms of providing up-to-date information on important ideas and trends in the field. Highly positive evaluations were given other aspects as well.

The keynote speakers gave stimulating and polished addresses on topics appropriate to the two workshops. Dr. Amal Rassam (Department of Anthropology, Queens College-CUNY) spoke on "Women in Moslem Societies: A Comparative Approach" and Dr. Laurie Wiseberg (Human Rights INTERNET) spoke on "Comparative Human Rights." In his welcome address Friday evening, West Virginia University President E. Gordon Gee indicated the University's support for FACDIS and its activities.

The Third Annual Workshops departed from the area approach which characterized the first and second FACDIS Workshops. A greater variety of disciplines were represented this year, making for particularly stimulating exchanges. Although it is obviously the case that the course interests of all FACDIS faculty members cannot be equally well satisfied by any one set of workshops, it is fair to say that over the last 3 years almost all faculty members found something valuable and useful. As usual, of course, the principal personal benefit which faculty reported was the opportunity to renew old acquaintances and make new acquaintances with others who share their teaching/research interests. Such well established communication networks will, we hope, be sustained by future FACDIS Workshops.

WEST VIRGINIA MODEL UN SECURITY COUNCIL

On March 4-5, 1983, the West Virginia Model UN Security Council was held at Jackson's Mill. Eighty-two students and 8 faculty advisors from 9 West Virginia colleges and universities attended this FACDIS sponsored simulation. Professor Dorothy Roberts (Political Science; Davis and Elkins College) and Professor Clair Matz (Political Science; Marshall University) were the Faculty Coordinators for the conference. Students from Marshall University were the Presiding Officers at the sessions.

The program was set up with two councils, each made up of 15 student-delegations representing the different countries that attend the actual UN Security Council. Institutions represented included: Bluefield State College, Davis & Elkins College, Fairmont State College, Marshall University, Potomac State College, Shepherd College, West Liberty State College, West Virginia University, and Wheeling College.
