Personal Statement:

Applicant must submit a personal statement of about 250 words explaining why you wish to attend, and how you plan to incorporate Institute information into the courses you teach. Please attach essay to application.

Credit:

Three hours of *free* graduate credit (History 930: Now You See It!) will be offered for participation in the Institute. Credit will be arranged through the WVU Office of Extended Learning. Professional development graduate credit is offered, which can be used for re-certification and salary increments, but cannot be used as credit toward a graduate degree program.

Eligibility:

"Now You See It!" International Sources and Resources for WV Classrooms July 5-10, 2009 Canaan Valley Resort and Conference Center

This week-long institute for pre-collegiate teachers is being offered to expand knowledge of internet and a/v sources for teaching international subjects. The institute is designed primarily for (but not limited to) middle school and high school teachers who wish to incorporate this knowledge into their curricula. Enrollment is limited to a maximum of forty teachers.

Today's students, as we all know, are increasingly oriented to visual learning and to internet resources. This summer's institute will be designed to provide practical information and hands-on instruction in how to teach international topics more effectively using film, videos, DVDs and the internet.

In addition to Tom Collins, who will again provide pedagogical support, three experts will feature various resources and specialized insights into teaching about different parts of the world. Professor Ken Martis of the WVU Department of Geography and Geology, who has used the internet extensively in the classroom, will provide instruction in accessing and using global geographical sources as well as designing a web site. In addition, he will present sessions with special emphasis on the Middle East and Israeli-Palestinian relations, a topic with deep historic roots and great contemporary relevance. Dr. James Siekmeier, a diplomatic and Latin American specialist from the WVU Department of History, will focus on both hemispheric subjects as well as such topics as the American involvement in Vietnam. Dr. Michael (Todd) Bennett of the Historian's Office of the U.S. Department of State will provide insight into visual materials on World War II and U.S.-Soviet relations.

Instructional Staff

Todd Bennett teaches at The George Washington University and the Corcoran College of Art and Design in Washington, DC. His teaching and scholarship explore the relationship between film and history, among other topics. Bennett's first book, Imagining World Community: Hollywood, Propaganda, and the Mediation of Wartime International Politics, 1939-1945, is under contract with the University of North Carolina Press. He is now working on a history of the American Bicentennial. Bennett, who has published in such academic journals as the Journal of American History and the International History Review, is Director of the Europe and Global Issues Division, Office of the Historian, U.S. Department of State.

Tom Collins has a wealth of practical experience in teaching. With degrees from Macalester College and the University of Minnesota, he spent ten years as a classroom teacher and social studies department head before becoming a consultant and field-test teacher for such organizations as the Foreign Policy Association and the American Forum for Global Education. While in Washington, D.C., he worked as consultant, curriculum developer, and evaluator for other major educational organizations as well as the U.S. Department of Education. From 1985-2003, he directed Project LINKS (Linking International Knowledge with Schools), part of the Elliot School of International Affairs of the George Washington University. In all, he has made presentations on various aspects of global education in 48 states to over 50,000 individuals.

Kenneth C. Martis, a member of the WVU faculty since 1975, has won numerous teaching awards, including a Lilly Endowment Postdoctoral Fellowship in Learning and Teaching, a National Council for Geographic Education award for best teaching unit, and a Fulbright Fellowship in Perugia, Italy. In the early 1990s he was a charter member of the West Virginia State Geographic Teachers Alliance. As part of the Alliance, Martis has taught at numerous summer institutes at Concord University and led many field trips for state K-12 teachers at national conventions. In addition, as part of the Alliance, he organized and hosted the first Advanced Placement Human Geography Teacher Training at WVU for state social science teachers. Martis has published six award-winning books since 1982 and was designated the 2007 "West Virginia Professor of the Year" by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

James F. Siekmeier received his Ph.D. in 1993 from Cornell University and is now an assistant professor of history at West Virginia University. He has taught courses on U.S. and Latin American history at colleges and universities in Washington, D.C., New York, Iowa, Texas, and in Bolivia on two Fulbright Fellowships, and has worked in the Office of the Historian, U.S. Department of State. He published Aid, Nationalism, and Inter-American Relations: Guatemala, Bolivia, and the United States, 1944-1961, in 1999. He is presently working on a manuscript, under review, entitled From The to Che: Bolivia and the United States, 1945-present.
