The Facility: Spruce Knob Mountain Center

TMI has a "living laboratory" in Pendleton County where they regularly offer a variety of mountain learning programs and summer workshops. TMI's Spruce Knob Mountain Center is located on the western slopes of Spruce Knob, West Virginia's highest peak at 4,863 feet. The facility is bordered by the Monongahela National Forest, and is noted for its diverse mountain habitats, wildlife, and proximity to other protected and wilderness areas. Since 1972, the 400-acre campus has hosted over 25,000 visitors to the Institute's Appalachian and international programs.

Celebrating the 2002 U.N. Year of the Mountains

The Program:

FACDIS and The Mountain Institute are cooperating to plan and host two 5-day professional development opportunities for our state's teachers, and to commemorate 2002 as the U.N. International Year of the Mountains, The U.N. states:

Mountains come in all shapes and sizes. Found on every continent, from the equator to the polar regions, they rise to different altitudes, in a great variety of climates and particular combinations of ecosystems. For millennia, mountains have served as vast reserves of valuable resources - such as water, energy and biological diversity - as well as key centres of culture and recreation.

Today, however, the rapid pace of globalization, urbanization and mass tourism are threatening mountain communities and the resources they depend on. Worldwide, mountain areas face increasing marginalization, economic decline and environmental degradation.

Our summer mountain program, held at Spruce Knob Mountain Center, will maintain a comparative approach as it focuses on such topics as:

- **♦** Importance of Mountains
- ♦ Natural Resources of Mountains
- ♦ Mountain Peoples of the World
- ♦ World Mountain Biospheres and Conservation
- ♦ Sacred Mountains

While instruction will maintain a global focus, the diverse and dynamic ecology of the Central Appalachian Mountain setting will serve as a laboratory for afternoon field trips to sites such as Spruce Knob, nearby Indian artifact sites, and to a case study biosphere, Blister Swamp.

Instructional Staff

Instruction will be conducted by staff of The Mountain Institute, supplemented by West Virginia University faculty. The lead instructor and organizer for the program is TMI's Director of Research and Education, Alton C. Byers.

Alton C. Byers, PhD, is a mountain geographer. specializing in mountain protected areas, conservation and development programs, and landscape change. He received his doctorate from the University of Colorado in 1987, focusing his research on landscape change in the Mt. Everest area of Nepal. He has been with TMI since 1990, and has worked with their programs in both Nepal and the Andes, as well as in Appalachia. Dr. Byers has organized a number of teacher workshops at TMI, including three years' experience with the Eisenhower teacher training program on mountain studies for science teachers in West Virginia, and a successful 2001 summer workshop for 24 teachers from the Missouri Geographic Alliance. He is married to Elizabeth Byers, Senior Program Officer for the Mountain Forum, a global network of mountain organizations which links grassroots organizations, research institutions, government and intergovernmental decision-makers, who will also participate on the instructional staff.

Facilities at Spruce Knob Mountain Center

The modern campus facilities include two "bunk houses," accommodating four people per room in bunk beds. A nearby bath house with modern shower and toilet facilities is available, with separate facilities for men and women. Meals are provided in the main building, which also includes a classroom and mini-library. Limited computer connections are available.

SKMC is located in Pendleton County, about 35 minutes from Franklin, WV, about one hour from Petersburg, and 90 minutes southeast of Elkins, in some of the least disturbed wilderness area remaining in the eastern United States.

Weekly Time Frame: Participants will arrive on Sunday, after 4 pm, and leave on Friday, by 4 pm.
